HOLLINS TROPHY

At the beginning of June, a group of skaters headed over to Sydney to compete at the Hollins Trophy. Centaurus was represented by Laura Mills, Anna Cairns, Nicholas Apperley, and Elizabeth & Juliette O'Neill.

First held in 1968, the Hollins Trophy is the oldest interstate figure skating competition held in Australia. This year the competition attracted 183 competitors from all over Australia and New Zealand. Next year, with the proposed introduction of synchronised skating, the competition will be even bigger.

For our skaters, this was their first real competition of the season. For Laura, this was a chance to repeat her 1st place success from last year. Unfortunately, this was not to be. Practising at the Macquarie Ice Rink on the first day, Laura was involved in a collision with another skater and suffered concussion. She didn't feel well enough to continue and withdrew from the competition.

Results for our remaining skaters were mixed. Juliette skated two solid performances to finish 5th out of 17 in the Pre Primary division. Anna skated a great short programme and was placed in 6th position. Her freeskate was not as good as her technical but she still managed to finish in 10th place. For Elizabeth, her technical skate was disappointing, but in true competitive spirit she was back the next day to pull off a very good freeskate and move up to 9th place. Our most successful skater was Nicholas Apperley. Nick didn't skate his best technical programme, but managed a great performance in his freeskate, with a 'clean' programme, to achieve 2nd place. Well done, Nick!



Skating in Europe – the ultimate Overseas Experience

For the most of 2002 and the beginning of 2003 I worked in London and travelling around Europe. Below are a few places I managed to get to where skating was the mission!



My first skating experience was driving (that included going through the Channel Tunnel from Britain) to Rouen, France to watch the World Synchronised Ice Skating Championships where I sat in awe amongst my British friends and took comprehensive notes - yet to be inflicted upon our own Synchronised Team 'Ice on Fire'.

I made it a goal while I was on my OE to keep up with my skating and to work towards competing at the World Ice Challenge in Bordeaux, France in early September 2002.

The World Ice Challenge brings together adult skaters (often referred to as recreational skaters) from all over the world to compete in dance, freeskate and interpretive classes of the competition.

My preparation for the event was largely in London at the Alexandra Palace ice skating rink where I was warmly welcomed into the rink's club sessions and received coaching in freeskate and dance. To my surprise I was not the only skater from 'down under' there and regularly shared the ice with two skaters from Canberra, Australia – also on their OE.

With the 8 hour train journey through France behind me, and friends from the club in London cheering me on, I competed in my first adult competition with an interpretive programme on (very) foreign soil and was awarded a silver medal. It was such a great experience to be amongst so many talented and dedicated adult skaters — many twice my age and fearless. Everyone at the event were very supportive and encouraging (including the Frenchman who was awarded the gold ahead of me) and I made some fantastic friends from all over the world. I learnt a lot from them about skating interpretive/artistic programmes. While I was the only skater from New Zealand, there were competitors from USA, Australia, Switzerland, France and Britain.

A further highlight was being allowed to watch the French Senior National Synchronised Ice Skating team train on the ice during a break in our competitions.

Two last skating experiences were equally exciting but for different reasons. One was skating at the outdoor rink erected in the courtyard of Somerset House in London just before Christmas. The other was, for me, a dream come true – skating in Russia.

After carrying my skates around a very chilly Moscow in December (-17 C) for a day I finally made my way to Gorky Park – principally a summer amusement park where in winter they flood the pathways and locals go ice skating. It was like being in a small town where people used their skates to get from place to place instead of walking. If anyone has seen the movie 'Gorky Park' then you will have an idea of how magical this part of the world is – a true winter wonderland.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank the club for this opportunity to share some of my experiences with you.
