AUSTRALIAN NATIONALS 2005

Report by Laura Mills

In 2005 I was selected to represent New Zealand in the Novice Ladies grade at the Australian National Championships in Perth.

I left Christchurch on 21 August bound for Perth, meeting up with most of the other New Zealand skaters at Auckland airport. It was a long trip of over 9 hours flying time – quite an ordeal for me as I am terrified of flying!!! Allie Rout from Auckland entertained me for some of the trip, watching films and chatting, so that helped take my mind off the scary turbulence!!



We arrived in Perth late evening, picked up a rental car, then spent nearly an hour getting lost in Fremantle trying to find our hotel. The next morning I had my first unofficial practice – this was also the morning I found out I was drawn to skate 23rd out of 23 skaters – a position which I'm not too fond of!!

The rink was situated in a light industrial area about a 20 minute drive from Fremantle. Although the rink was bigger than ours. I think the Alpine rink compared more favourably, with much nicer facilities and surroundings, but unfortunately just as cold inside.

I had some really good practice sessions, but unfortunately a disappointing competition and felt I could have done so much better. However, from watching the other skaters, I did learn heaps and gained some valuable experience. The standard of the top skaters in each grade was very high, not so much jump wise, but in spins, footwork, presentation, and speed. I felt from watching them that I needed to improve my speed, fitness, have more confidence in my own abilities, and not be fazed out by other skaters. I feel that my skating will improve because of this experience.

The new judging system was in use for the junior and senior grades. It was guite hard to comprehend at first, and some of the results took ages to appear. There were also a few mix ups with results, especially in the junior grade where the original rankings were wrong, and the final results were not available till the next day.

The highlight of the competition for me was the Senior Ladies grade, and the battle between their two top skaters - Joanne Carter and Miriam Manzano. Joanne Carter had an amazing technical programme, landing a triple lutz double loop combination, triple flip, coupled with outstanding spins and speed. However, in the freeskate, Miriam Manzano fought back with an awesome programme which included 2 really high triple lutzes and a great triple loop, narrowly winning 1st place overall.

In between watching all this great skating and supporting the other NZ team members, I managed to fit in a little sightseeing. Fremantle was a really interesting town with well preserved historic buildings. I had a tour through a submarine at the Maritime Museum, a visit to the historic Fremantle Prison, and a drive north via Perth's beaches where I saw the Indian Ocean for the first time. And to top it all, my favourite occupation - shopping!!!

Thank you to all those skaters, parents, and coaches for their support, and to the club members who helped with my fundraising.

Maintaining your Skates

A few things to keep in mind, now that you have invested mega-dollars in your skates!

- 1. Your skates are made of leather. This means that your skates should be stored somewhere in an open place with good air circulation. NOT in your skate bag. Like you the leather needs to breathe.
- 2. After you have skated, open up the boot to help it dry out.
- 3. Do not put your skates in front of a heater to dry. The heat will cause the leather to crack. Leave your skates in a warm place but not with direct heat. If it is too hot for your skin, it is too hot for your skates.
- 4. The blades will rust if moisture collects on them. Wipe the blades with a dry towel after skating. Use soft skate covers to store your skates. Hard blade covers or walking guards should not be used for extended periods. They retain moisture and your blades will rust if they are left in them—this can happen within a few days.
- 5. Always wear socks or tights in your skates, otherwise the sweat from your feet will eventually break down the lining of the boot and rust the rivets. Plus you are more likely to get blisters. Ouch. No sympathy.
